Even when no Big ten clashes were scheduled, Penn State's men's hockey team kept busy, as the pictures below demonstrate. Early in January, the team hosted its annual Free Skate, giving fans young and old alike the chance to interact with some of their favorite players (pictures 1 and 2).

During their "bye" weekend in February, the Lions held what they hope becomes an annual charity event — the "Sled Hockey Classic" - with the Happy Valley Coyotes, a team providing opportunities for individuals with cognitive or developmental challenges to play hockey. With many Roar Zone members in attendance, the Coyotes came away with a hard-fought 6-5 victory on an OT buzzer-beater (picture 3). Penn State sophomore forward Dylan

Lugris was the driving force behind the event, which raised over \$20,000 for the Happy Valley Special Hockey Association. Coach Gadowsky was impressed and proud; "I never thought he (Lugris) would have pulled it off, and he did. He was able to do it because every single guy participated somehow."

Coach Gadowsky must have also been impressed and proud of his team in, of all places, the Bryce Jordan Center. At halftime of the cagers game vs. Illinois, Penn State honored its athletes who attained a 3.0 GPA or higher; a whopping 20+ players from the hockey team were so honored (picture 4).

ASK COACH GADOWSKY

Editor's Note: The 2022-23 season marks the tenth season in Pegula Ice Arena, and not coincidentally the tenth of Big Ten men's hockey. A lot has happened to Penn State hockey during that time, almost all of it good, but Coach Gadowsky's views show that not everything needs to change.

Question: How are players different today from 10 years ago? To what do you attribute these changes?

Coach Gadowsky: With so much emphasis on individual skills and individual training I do feel the overall skill of players today is better. However, I still feel the differentiator is how you think the game and how

competitive players are, so in that sense some things never change.

Question: How has the play on ice changed in this time period?

Coach Gadowsky: Usually college hockey mirrors the trends of the NHL, which is also seeing an uptick in skill players as opposed to bigger, tougher, stronger, meaner players. Recent rule changes are also geared towards more room on the ice resulting in a desire for speed over brawn, however it seems in the playoffs for some reason the game settles back a little towards the past.

Question: How have your coaching actions/philosophy/ style changed to adapt to the abovementioned changes?



Coach Gadowsky: We have always been a very fast offensive team, so we feel that the trend is moving more toward how we like to play. That being said, you always have to try to stay ahead of the curve, and our staff has tried to adapt to rule changes to benefit our

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THE VOICE OF PEGULA, RODNEY MARTIN



Editor's note: In thinking about the last 10 years of PSU hockey that I witnessed, my mind started wandering – from Penn State varsity hockey to club hockey, and then to hockey outside of Penn State. And I remembered not just the games and players, but the oddities, the things that you see once in a lifetime. I thought I'd check with my favorite rink announcer to see how his memories compare to mine.

Question: What's the oddest coaching move you've ever witnessed?

Editor: This is not just the oddest coaching move, it's really the oddest incident, period. During the club hockey days, there were 2 or 3 teams that were the Lions' biggest rivals. Weekend series against these teams in Greenburg were special. Well, one Saturday afternoon, Penn State was really laying the wood on one of these teams - from the opening face-off, it was no contest. Penn State had to have been up by at least 5 goals heading to intermission. The horn went off, and Penn State headed towards the locker room. Not their opponents – they just sat, and sat, and sat. Until the next period began. Good thing for them that there were no public seating areas on the side of the arena where the player benches were.

RM: I do indeed remember that. And as I recall, it didn't do anything as we continued to dominate that game. I have also heard, though cannot confirm first-hand, that sometimes coaches don't let their players shower before getting dressed to get on the bus after a game. That is down-right brutal, in my opinion. Doesn't the coach also have to ride that same bus to the hotel/airport?

I remember a shootout we had in the first couple of years at Pegula. One of Penn State's defenseman came out to take a shot and I thought "What is he doing out there"? Of course, the player goes out there and pulls one of the silkiest shootout attempts I have ever seen. Obviously this wasn't an odd coaching move, it was the right move. It (once again) made me realize that I just talk into a microphone - what do I know about coaching?

Editor: Yeah, you and all of us fans.

Question: What's the most embarrassing player moment you can recall?

RM: Going back to the club days, I can share an embarrassing moment for some visiting players that happened in the

penalty box. My announcing position used to be between the penalty boxes in Greenburg. We used to have members of the Hockey Management Association serving as off-ice officials and in charge of opening/closing the door for the players. More often than not we would have a fe-



male as the official in the away team box. I can remember a few times when an opposing player was more interested in talking with her than getting out on the ice when the penalty expired, and that led to not getting back in the action right away.

Editor: That is what is referred to as a "teaching moment." I remember attending a lopsided ACHA tournament game when a penalty was called and the goalie skated off the ice. Trouble was, the penalty was called on his team and not the opposition. Ooops!

RM: I have yet to see a goalie leave the crease thinking the penalty was on the other team - typically they are very wary of that and err on the side of caution.

Question: Has anything happened at a game where you thought "Now what happens?"

RM: The Icers had a December game against a team that had been dealing with some significant injuries. The rules state that a team must have two goaltenders available and dressed at the start of a game and the opposing team did indeed have two. However, midway through the game, the starting netminder was injured, and this is where the confusion set in. The team had dressed a forward who would have been a scratch due to injury as their "backup" goalie, not thinking that their starter would eventually have to leave the game. So now the referees and coaches get together to try to figure out what to do. Turns out that one of the starting defensemen for them had goaltending experience, but was obviously dressed to be a skater that night. We ended up with about a 20 minute delay in the middle of the second period so that the defenseman could go into the locker room and change into goalie gear. I had to make a lengthy announcement explaining the situation. To the player's credit, he didn't play half-bad.
